In commenting upon public events of the year retrospect and prospect, the Belfast Whig, on New Year's Day made the following sane, sensible and independent reference to Ulster's position on the vexed and very important question: "The settlement of the boundary question which had so long acted as a powerful irritant in both Northern and Southern Ireland, has by some commentators been held worthy to rank with the conclusion of the agreement between the chief belligerents in the great war as a victory for the cause of peace and reconciliation. There is no Loyalist in Ulster who does not sincerely hope that this sanguine estimate will be justified, but all who have studied the history of their country will be chary of indulging in ultraoptimistic expectations. 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
