#### EDITORIAL

The Fateful Thirteen

Not the slightest objection has been heard from the most superstitious Liberal anywhere, to the majority of "13" on the closure motion in the House of Commons last week. The King Government last week carried three divisions, one on closure, the Bird motion of "the previous question," and the main motion for adoption of the Address. At 12.30 Wednesday morning Parliament adjourned until March 15th. Closure was carried on Mr. Lapointe's motion at 3.15 o'clock Tuesday afternoon by a majority of thirteen. The vote was 108 to 95. The Government had the support of every Progressive, every Independent and every Laborite. The recult of the three votes were received with tumultous demonstrations from the Liberal and Conservative members alike: After House Leader Lapointe had formerly moved the forwarding of the Address, and the adjournment of the House till March 15th, the house rose to sing "God Save the King" in unison; the French Liberals followed with "O Canada" and three lusty cheers for Hon. Ernest Lapointe, who had led the Administration through the difficult preliminary session.

Must Make New Contract

Four or five years' experience has proven that the contract made with the Canadian National Railway for supply of water at the tank and in the station has not proven satisfactory from a financial standpoint, to the municipality of the village of Acton. It was estimated that at the reduced rate at which the water is metred to the railway company a revenue of about \$1,200 per year would be derived by the town. Instead of that, however, it is stated that an average of about \$500 per year is being received. The first five-year contract expires the coming summer. In view of the discrepancy in revenue from this contract the Council has given the required six months' notice that the contract will not be reneved on the basis of the original arrangement. The contract has been an exceedingly favorable one for the Canadian National Railway Company. It is estimated that the cost of maintenance, fuel and engineer's salary, when a pumping plant was operated here, was upwards of \$3,000 per year. The company will therefore have made a financial saving of about \$12,000 in cold cash by their agreement with Acton's Waterworks system during the live-year term. is very clear that they can at least pay to the town against their independent pumping plant, which they operated here for over fifty years. It is reported that as much or more water is used now from Acton's Waterworks' system as was used when the railway's own plant was maintained.

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
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
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
