1922 Canadian exports were \$753,000,000; in. 1926 \$1,328,000,000. -The favorable balance of trade (net excess of exports over imports), was \$6,000,000 in 1922-in 1926 it stood at \$401,000,000.

In 1922 the exports of the United States were \$3,771,000,000 in 1926, \$4,764,000,000. The favorable balance of trade in the United States in 1923 was \$697,000,000. By 1926 it had docreased to \$352,000,000. This figure is for the twelve months ending March 31st in both countries. The American fiscal year ends June 30th. In the year ending June 30, 1925, the favorable balance of trade in the United States was \$1,040,452,789. For year ending June 30, 1926, it was \$286,828,-

Balance of trade is not everything in national prosperity. There 'might even come a day when our position would be reversed and we might still be prosperous. It is a good thing under present conditions. It enables us to meet our foreign obligations. It establishes our slovency in the eyes of the world. It has brought our currency back to par-it even stands at a slight premium as I-write these

words. In the Budget address of 1917, Sir Thomas White, Minister of Finance in the Cabinet with Hon. Arthur Meighen, said: "During the last fiscal year the favorable balance trade increased to \$314,000,000. Figures such as that indicate a very prosperous condition within the Dominion."
