The World's Speediest Cable

The new submarine cable just laid from Pensance, England, to Bay Roberts, Newfoundland, is the 19th trans-Atlantic cable. The cost of laying it was estimated at \$1,000 per nautical mile. The speed of transmission over it—eight times faster than the ordinary cable—is made possible by a sheath of the new metal 'permalloy', which envelops the copper conductor. Permalloy, an alloy of nickel and iron, was developed in the Rell Telephone Labor-atories, and possesses what the engineers call a "magnetic permeability" many times that of any other known sub-stance. The speed of the new cable is 2,500 letters a minute, and extension of its 3,400 mile length will bring about a close linking up of New York & London.



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


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
