

Mr. Zimmerman claimed that as Premier Ferguson had forced the question into a political issue, it would be the natural thing for all electors who had the moral interests of the community at heart to make their strongest efforts to defeat the wiles of the liquor interests which are manifestly at the back of his movement to secure the free sale of intoxicating liquors. "The principle of prohibition is all right," he declared. "Our municipal, provincial and dominion laws are full of prohibition; I am a prohibitionist first, list and always, when the protection and betterment of the people is at stake."
