Col. Steve Marshall In High S. A. Position

Takes a Complete Headquarters Staff from New York to Boston

The Boston Globe says:

"Col. Stephen Marshall who succeeds Commissioner W. A. McIntyre as commander of the Home Guard of England has arrived in Boston with his headquarters staff to take over his duties here. Commissioner McIntyre died last week, and his successor is to be appointed as soon as possible.

Col. Marshall comes to re-organize the command and to make arrangements for the recruitment of recruits. Although the atmosphere of the change sounds like the movements of an invading army Col. Marshall prefers to think that he is not a conqueror of a country rather than a soldier, since he has spent 4 years crusading in the Salvation Army. He compares his position to that of a Methodist Bishop and that of a Cardinal chief as elders in the church.

The new hierarchy of the church includes besides Col. Marshall, his wife, Mrs. Marshall, and Mrs. William H. Hamlin, wife of Mr. William H. Hamlin, and Mr. T. W. Margraves, Mrs. Margraves is a "Sally Officer" aide-de-camp, chaplain and Lieutenant-Colonel of the home guard.

The Marshalls have six children, five sons and a daughter. The girl and three of the sons are officers in the church and are serving in the states and abroad. One son is serving in the Colonies.
