INJURED BY FALL FROM TRAIN

Twenty-Year-Old Girl Had Hurt When He Leaped Train Between Leacock and Guelph

On Thursday evening the train from Guelph, that is en route to Acton at 8:15 p. m., was a half hour late, and the reason was that a young girl, who was a passenger, had leaped from the train or fallen off while the train was en route. The girl, who was twenty years of age, was named Mary. A search was made for the girl but she could not be discovered, although a crew had been sent back to search for her. The case is evidently explained by the following item from the Guelph Mercury of Saturday last week: "Blooded profusely about the head and covered with bruises, 12-year-old Robert Leacock, of 5 Hill Lane, Galt, was found about ten o'clock Friday night, lying in a ditch about three miles from the city on the York Road, by Mr. Edward Coad, 89 Lorraine Road. Mr. Coad was proceeding toward the city in his motor car when he saw the body in the ditch of the headlight, lying in a ditch about three miles from the city in his car. He immediately stopped and placed him in the rear seat. The boy appeared very dazed. Mr. Coad immediately called the police station, where he handed the lad into the care of the officer on duty. In explanation of his injury the boy told Coad that he had fallen off a train. He lived in Galt, he said, and his father worked in the Galt Cigar plant. The Chief immediately set in touch with the parents and summoned a physician to attend to his case and to take the anxious father arrived shortly after the 'phone call, and stated that the boy had been on a day of his life. The little lad had been sent to the butcher shop by his mother, and when he returned with the meat was about 20 cents in the change. He was sent back to the store to collect the change, and that was the last time the parents saw him until he was picked up here."
