Guelph Junction Railway Dividend is  
Declared

Guelph Junction Railway directors at  
their annual meeting in Guelph on Mon-  
day re-elected J. M. Taylor President  
for a second term. A dividend of 9½ per cent. for the last year was  
declared, the earnings of the road for  
1927 showing a slight increase over  
1926. Ex-Ald. J. W. McLean, who had  
been a director agent on the railway for  
the past five years, handed in his resigna-  
tion, but no action was taken regarding  
the appointment of a successor. Mr. McLean, 44, has been a member of  
the Guelph Civic Council, Guelph, and  
was chosen Vice-President, and City Assess-  
ment Commissioner O. D. Hastings, Sec-  
retary-Treasurer.
