Public School Board

Proposed New Covered Rink for Acton Plans Matured for Providing This Much-Desired Utility Without

Detailed Information Respecting the

Increase in Taxation The proposal for the erection of a new modern substantial covered rink for Acton, which will give ample accommodation for the healthful winter pastimes of skating and curling, under comfortable conditions, and for hockey games, now so popular, has occupied the attention of many of our

The matter of plans and specifications, ways and means, advantages to the community, and methods for securing such a desirable utility with the advantage of municipal control, as provided for by the statutes, and without any increase in the taxation of the town, has received the careful consideration of the Municipal Council and the Acton Chamber of Commerce, both in their individual capacity and in joint session. Every point relating to the innate need and manifest desirability of such community privileges, the type and cost of the necessary building; the creeting and administration thereof without placing a burden upon our ratepayers, has been carefully studied and critically surveyed. Information has been sought from other towns, experiences and necessary data secured, and audited statements collected respecting cost of erection of a building of the character desired, the cost of operation and maintenance, and the revenues derived.

After careful consideration of all the data obtainable the Municipal Council and the Chamber of Commerce have come to the conclusion that with proper executive oversight in the erection and administration of a skating and curling rink in Acton, the enterprise can be successfully carried through and permanently conducted during the period covered by the debentures to be issued to meet the cost of erection and equipment, without, the placing of any additional rate upon the assessable property of the

In order that all ratepayers may have the facts clearly before them the

committee appointed at the joint meeting of Acton Municipal Council and Acton Chamber of Commerce to secure definite facts relative to the enterprize, have pleasure in taking the public of the community fully into their confidence, and present herewith the gist of the information they have secured, as follows: . 1. A building of sizel construction, covered with sizel roof and siding, with an ice area 70x175 feet, giving accommodation for skating and hockey games, with seating accommodation for 1,500 persons, and an additional

area containing three standard rinks for curling, complete and ready for the

ice, at a cost of \$15,000 or under. Competent contractors are prepared to

fulfil above specifications at this estimate. 2. The five per cent, debentures for \$15,000 to be issued by the Corporation of Acton,-if the ratepayers give their approval to the proposal, o per the By-law, published in another column,-will require the annual payment of \$1,203.40, to meet and liquidate the above amount in twenty years The experience of other properly conducted and maintained enterprises of a similar character, in other towns of equal or lower population to that of Acton, have proven that the net revenues from skating, curling hockey matches, etc., have been sufficient to meet the annual payments of interest, and to retire the debentures when they become due. Audited

statements are in possession of the Committee to substantiate this. 4. In order, however, to provide against any possible peradventure as to the net revenues failing to meet the annual amount required for principal and interest, and to protect our ratepayers against any assessment to cover any such deficit, the Committee has secured this provision, namely: Messrs. Beardmore & Co. have given undertakings to pay up to \$200 per annum during a ten-year period if and when in any year the net revenues fall below \$1,000. To supplement this the signatures of 247 citizens, the majority of whom are property owners, and the remainder substantial residents in business or in permanent positions in town have been willingly given, each of whom has agreed to pay up to \$5.00 per year, after the payment of the above \$200 has been made, if any such annual payment is

5. To show that substantial revenues are obtainable when such an enterprise is given proper supervision and management, the Committee is in possession of statements of a chartered account relative to a rink in a town of almost identical population of Acton, giving the receipts last year at \$1,209.00 from skating, \$266.00 from curling, and \$2,028.00 from the hockey matches, and in addition a considerable amount for concessions to refreshments booths, and the cost of maintenance deducted left the substantlai net revenue for the year of \$1,437.60.

The Committee honestly feel that it is in the best interests of the people of Acton to give their support to this enterprise and their vote in its favor at the election on May 7 next. It will provide healthful amusement and clean sport; it will relieve the present anxiety of many parents whose children are now attracted to rinks in outside towns, travelling by trains or other conveyances which necessarily keeps them away from home until midnight and after; it will add an attractive building to our splendid Park, which will be available for picnic parties, lawn socials and other gatherings, especially if inclement weather is experienced. It will greatly enhance the utilities of Acton Pall Pair by providing a commodious, wellappointed new building for exhibition purposes.

Ratepayers of Acton, we have gone to considerable effort to provide you substantiated facts for your consideration in deciding upon your action at the polls on May 7. As fellow-ratepayers with families of our own, after the most carnest consideration of all facts available, we feel that we can honestly and conscientiously solicit your favorable consideration of this Important proposal.
