 —Canada has been waiting her forest capital and to-day only 27% remains.

 —The snowstorm of Saturday night and Sunday morning left a covering of about three inches in depth.

Services by Dr. Solandt

The services in the United Church last Sunday were conducted by Rev. Donald M. Solandt, D. D., of the United Church Book Room, Toronto. Dr. Solandt preached two able discourses. In the morning his theme was the Father's love and companionship, and was based upon the words of the evangelist, “John 3:1, ‘Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God.’” It was a very encouraging sermon, full of expression of God's love and communion. In the evening service that noted passage in St. Paul's letter to the Philippians, chapter 3, verse 10, was the basis of a very comforting theme: “That I may know Him, and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings.” It was a strong and helpful discourse, and emphasized the position of Paul in prison, and evidently suffering physically, but rejoicing in Christ and His resurrection and fellowship.
