Canada's Sixty-First Birthday

Once again the year has rolled round and Canada will on Sunday and Monday celebrate the Sixty-first Anniversary of Confederation. Although there is perhaps not as much ceremony and fanfare in this year's celebration as that which marked the Diamond Jubilee last year, Canadians will from coast to coast join in a joyous manner the days that commemorate the nation's birthday this year as on the auspicious occasion of 1827.

The past year has been another one of marked progress in the nation's many departments—the mines, the forests, the farming, the foreign trade, the manufacturing and the public utilities and the other interests that go to make this country great have all shown steady advancement.
Of Canada's future Hon. Stanley Baldwin says: "Canada has an enormous future. The future is with you, do not let it slip away. You are a country for men of the North, virile races. Quality before quantity any day. Build up with the best. What does it matter if it is a hundred years or two hundred years or more, before your country is fully built? Keep the stock you have, and the men and women you have, and see to it that the coming generations are in no wise inferior to them. Maintain the values, maintain the standards."
