FARM CENTRE FOR BOYS
Fine New Building Opened and Dedicated at Pullerton

Judge Moore was at Pullerton yesterday taking part in the opening and dedication of a fine new farm centre for boys in Pullerton Township, near Millbrook.

Miss Hattie Baker founded this home for boys a number of years ago, and for eight or ten years it has been under the administration of the Board of Evangelical and Social Service of the United Church of Canada. Over three hundred boys, who have appeared in the juvenile courts and been placed on probation, have been cared for at this farm. They are placed on farms with Christian people, and the result has been very satisfactory. Applications are on file all the time for boys from this centre, and in numbers of cases where they have been homeless, they have been adopted and become members of farming households.

A fine new brick and concrete building, with accommodation for about twenty boys, has now been erected on the farm of 160 acres.

Rev. Dr. Moore, of Toronto, made the dedicatory address. Rev. Dr. McIntosh, President of London Conference, conducted the service, and Rev. Dr. MacLellan, Secretary of the Board of Evangelical and Social Service, accepted the property on behalf of the United Church of Canada.

A highly respected citizen of Erin Township passed peacefully away on Tuesday, June 19, in the person of David H. McCleure, in his fifty-second year, following a short illness from pneumonia. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John McCleure, of Erin Township, where he lived until about fourteen years ago, when he purchased the farm where he passed away. Eight years ago he united in marriage with Miss M. Campbell, who survives him; he is also survived by three brothers and one sister: Mrs. M. Harris, Cheltenham; W. A. McCleure, Erin Township; and George McCleure, Erin Township. The funeral took place from his late residence on Friday afternoon, when the remains were interred in Greenwood Cemetery. The service was held at the home of Mrs. M. Harris, Cheltenham. The pall-bearers were Messrs. John McCleure, Wm. Kirkwood, Herbert MacKay, H. McKay, Clayton Rogers and Isaac Bennett. Friends and relatives were present at the funeral. The Rev. Mr. Campbell, of Erin Township, officiated. The funeral was held at 10 o'clock on Thursday at Milton, Ontario.
