An Increase in Industrial Accidents Reported

Up to the end of June, the Workmen's Compen sation Board had received reports of 276 fatalities in industry, covering the first half of 1928. This is higher than the previous six months when there were 243 fatalities. Commenting on these, R. B. Morley, general manager, Industrial Accident Prevention Associations, said there had been 5,157 fatalities report ed, to the Board in thirteen years, or an average of almost four hundred for each year. The average cost of a death under compensation is about \$3,600 for all cases and where dependents are left the figures are much higher. Industrial fatalities are usually looked upon as being the unusual type of accident yet a close analysis of the figures reveals that most of these are due to fairly common causes and that often the degree of severity is purely an "accident." In June the Compensation Board received a total of 6,806 reports on accidents including 37 fatalities. In the same month, awards totalled \$536,962.47, of which \$101,783.98 was for medical aid. The total awards for the first half of 1928 amounted to \$3,515. 124.17, including \$577,549.66 for medical aid. Total awards for the last half of 1927 were \$3,093,157.02. of which \$539,865.30 was for medical aid.
