The jury's finding read as follows: "We, the jury empanelled to enquire into the death of Dr. Roy Stewart, find that he died at the Guelph General Hospital on July 9, from injuries received on June 20, when his car collided with a truck driven by one, George Diltz, and owned by William Poulds, of Toronts, two miles cast of Rockwood. According to the evidence submitted, we feel that no blame is attached to the driver of the truck, and conclude that it was purely accidental."
