TRAFALGAR CONTINUES EXPENSIVE FIGHT

The County Equalization of Assessment to have Another Commission

It is reported this week that Trafalgur Council will not drop its appeal in the recent county equalization findings, as was expected. Buch was the decisionreached after a lengthy debate.

Judge Elliot heard the appeals on two former occasions, but now the matter goes before a commission appointed by Order-in-Council of the Ontario Government. The members of that commission will include Judge Elliot, of Halton, Judge Justin, of Peel County, and either Registrar V Chisholm, of Milton, or Clerk of the Court McClennhan, of

The suggestion of the Trafalgar Council was a commission of three judges. Consequently Reeve Morden and Deputy-Reeve Galbratth were named a committee to interview the Government. The former equalization, against which the appeal stands, levied 26.9 per cent. of the county expenditure on Trafalgar,

but the Council feels that this is an unfair proportion. Trafalgar's decision will mean opening up the whole question of county assessment, which has already taken up months of deliberation and thousands of dollars of expense to the county and to municipalities which are quite willing to ablde by Judge Elliot's careful, exhaustive and impartial finding.

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
