Local Exhibitors Secure Prizes for Percheron and Clydesdale Horses and Short-horn Cattle

Among the winners in the big stock exhibits at Toronto Exhibition just week from this district were: Taffer and Hill, Milton, Ont., on "Freighter," in the four-year-old Clydesdale stallion class.

For Percherons, Amos and Black, of Moffat, won first on "Boan Banner," and Bruce A. McKinnon, Hillsburg, second on "Honey Bield," for both, three years and over. For both, junior calf, Amos & Black won fifth on "Libanon Chief," and the same exhibitors took second for both, senior champion, on "Boan Banner." For cow, three years and over, Amos & Black on "Lovely of Hearty Ridge," took fourth. They also won fourth and eighth for heifer, senior yearling, with "Mayflower Gem 2nd" and "Toscaud Princess." In the heifer senior class they won fifth and seventh on "Strathalen Dan" and "Chie's Lavender." For graded herd they took third place and for four calves, bred and owned by exhibitor, they won third. Second place for two genuine progeny of one cow, was also won by them.

In the Percheron horse class, Clarence Grunty, of Campbellville, was fourth on "December" for best three-year-old stallion, and fourth on "Nelle Gray" for best geld mare, any age. Hugh Rodney, of Milton, on "Grey Bess" took third for best filly, two years old, and third for best yearling mare, any age.
