



I strolled down Fifth Avenue the other day and was much impressed by the handsome displays of holiday cards arranged by several of America's leading. jewellery stores. The book and stationery marts, the many quaint little card shops, and the greeting card departments of the mammoth stores in the shopping section, are all displaying new designs and people are making their selections early in order to get just what they want and have their names put on in plenty of time to avoid the holiday rush.
