



OR EXAMPLE, seven years ago the aver-I age interval from the time you lifted your telephone receiver until the operator answered was 5.1 seconds. Today the claster finds the missial cut to de seconds - Chierrow it why be still less.

Seven years ago there were 95 slow calls in every 1,000-a slow call being one in which the operator takes ten seconds or more to answer. Today there are only 33 in every thousand.

The number of errors of all kinds has been reduced from 40 in every 1,000 calls to 16, which is over ninety-eight per cent perfect.

TIVE YEARS AGO you ran 27 chances in P every 1,000 calls of getting the wrong number. That is down now to 13 chances in 1,000, or nearly 99 times out of the 100 right.

There are only two chances in a thousand now that you will be cut off. There were five ' chances in a thousand, five years ago. There used to be eight times in a thousand calls when you would break in on somebody

else's conversation. Now there are only two such double connections per thousand. THERE ARE "CLOCKERS" at work in

I other directions too and here are some of the things they have recorded. The time taken to repair "trouble" on a line now has been cut to one-third of the time

taken five years ago. The time taken to install a new telephone used to be three hours and forty-five minutes. It has been cut now to one hour and forty-five minutes. That means something in hours saved, with 139,000 telephones installed in Ontario and Quebec this year.
