(The Epistle to Philemon was written probably about 62 or 63 A. D., while Paul was a prisoner in Rome, The circumstances which underlie the writing of the book may be given briefly. Phile-, mon was a wealthy citizen of Colossae, who had been converted to Christianity, as had also his wife, Apphia, and his fly son Archippus. Their standing in the Christian community is indicated by the fact that the church met in Philemon's house. Philemon had a slave named Onesimus, a good-for-nothing fellow who stole some of his master's money and ran away. After protracted wanderings the runaway slave finally drifted to Itome, where he encountered Paul and through his instrumentality was led to Christ. He showed the completeness of his conversion by the kindly and helpful spirit that he showed toward Paul. Both Paul and Onesimus, however, feit that his complete salvation could be attained
