> To Enlarge Hydro Sub-Station The Ontario Hydro Electric Commission is at present considering plans for the extension of the present sub-station Georgetown Hydro Commission, on Edinburgh Road, Quelph, which has not the required capacity to distribute the increased power which is being used throughout the district. When the substation was erected, it was laid out to handle about 2,500 h. p., whereas today over 10,000 h. p. is being distributed.
