A Scottish Investigation

of Health of Scotland has been carry- man. ing on an investigation in regard to the nutrition of school children. the schools of seven centres selected for the study, the children were divided into groups. The objective was to asccitain whether or not the children who received a daily ration of milk would show improvement in health greater than those who did not receive the milk or those who received a biscuit only. The result was that the children recolving milk were, after a time, found to be twenty per cent, heavier and 'taller than those not receiving milk. There was, in other words, a decided improvement better. This improvement was not temprove while the milk ration was maintained during a second period of investi-

This is not the only investigation of the kind that has been made. Other studies of a similar nature, in many countries, have shown that, during the growing years, milk, as an article of dict, is essential. The need and value of milk cannot be too strongly emphasized, because we have no substitute for
