The committee requested to meet with the Council and confer on the building of the new Acton arena met last evening with the following present: Reeve A. O. T. Beaudry, E. T. Theford, Dr. R. J. Nelson and C. Hansen, and Col. A. O. T. Beaudry, Dr. H. A. Coxe, J. M. McDonald, H. J. Kerr, N. H. Gordon and G. A. Dills.

Upon motion Reeve Mason was elected chairman of the meeting and G. A. Dills secretary.

It was deemed advisable to appoint an Advisory Committee of not more than seven, to work in conjunction with the Council on the building of the arena and committee was too large. The following Building Committee, to act in an advisory capacity to the Council, was appointed, with Reeve Mason as Chairman and Counsellors Hansen and Theford and Messrs. O. T. Beaudry, Dr. H. A. Coxe, J. M. McDonald and R. J. Kerr.

It was the unanimous decision of the committee that the Park was the only logical location and this site was therefore definitely settled upon as the first step towards the erection of the arena.

Plans of the building, its location, to be secured and other details occupied considerable attention. The meeting of the Advisory Committee will be held July 1, as soon as this date has been secured. It was the expressed wish that the building be completed in August—so as to be ready for use for this year's Fall Fair as an exhibition hall.
