March Shows Employment Gain

There was a moderate gain in employment at th beginning of March, according to monthly statements furnished to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics by 6,422 of the larger employers of labor in Canada. The working forces of these firms aggregated 044.681.

This increase of nearly 8.600 workers cauthe index number (based upon the average for 1926 as 100) to rise from 110.5 on February 1, to 111.4 at the beginning of March, as compared with 102.6 on March 1, 1928. The largest increases took place in manufacturing, but improvement was also indicated in construction, communications and services, while logging, mining, transportation and trade were seasonally slacker. The trend was upward in the Maritime Provinces, Ontario and British Columbia but in Quebec and the Prairie Provinces contractions were indicated.

The National Wealth of Canada

A survey of the national wealth of Canada for the year 1926 has just been completed by the Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics. This survey places the aggregate wealth of the country, exclusive of un developed natural resources, µt \$26,691,482,000, equal to about \$2,842 per head of population. In five years the increase in total wealth has been nearly \$3,500, 000,000. That agriculture is the most important bere. factor of Canada's wealth is shown by the fact that the largest item in the total is \$7,817,718,000 credited to agriculture or 29.28 per cent. of the whole. CITIZENS ARE REQUESTED TO COMPLY WITH THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT

Notice is hereby given that all residents of Acton are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig styes, water closets, outbuildings and other premises, and remove therefrom all dirt. manure, and other substances which may endanger 'he public health, and to have the same ompleted by the eighth day of May in it, on which day the Santary Inspector will commence a general aspection, and further take notice that he section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs between the 15th of May and the 16th of November, except in pens at least 70 feet from any dwelling house, and 50 feet from any street or lane, with floors kept clear rom all standing water and regularly cleansed, will be strictly enforced. All citizens are earnestly requested to keep their premises constantly clear and horoughly disinfected. AMOS MASON.
