IRISH CHAMPION COMING

Jack O'Reilly, the Irish marathon champion, will also be here. He was born at Parrhill, Galway, in 1904. Early in life he showed an aptitude for athletics, but it was not until 1922 that he took to long distance running. In that year Mr. Thomas Hyman, the veteran runner, put up two medals for a mile race in South Park. O'Reilly was the winner. This same distance was run the next year by a number of Irish competitors, and O'Reilly was again the victor. His next race was at Pallan-naive, the following August, in the two mile race at the avian sports. Here he won again.

In 1923 he was second in the mile championship of Ireland. In his next race—an eight mile championship of Ireland, he was victorious. The same year (1923) he won his first 24 1/2 mile marathon race for Ireland. The following year he repeated the same feat in the marathon race. In his third marathon in Ireland, from Nara to Dublin, 28 1/2 miles, he was again successful. Further statistics show that O'Reilly has won the Irish marathon race five years in succession and is still the unbeaten champion of Ireland. His last race was in Toronto on May 24, 1929, in the first National Championship marathon race. Here he was fourth and the first Toronto man in, thus receiving the Star trophy.

Entered Into Rest

MRS. GEO. HOGG, Hampton. The funeral of Mrs. Geo. Hogg took place at Hampton on Monday of last week. She was in her sixty-third year, and was born in the Township of Alton, near Bolton, being a daughter of the late William Wilson, and a life-long resident of Peel County. For many years she resided in the first line west, Chiquanacouy, before going to Hampton, two years ago. Her husband predeceased her eight years ago, and she only daughter, Ruby, died last April, leaving three small children, whose care was too much for her. Four sons, George, of Hampton; William, Ernest and Herbert, Chiquanacouy; two sisters, Mrs. M. McKerral, Glenora, and Mrs. Herbert Hawk, of Hampton, Ont.; and two brothers, William, of Alton, and William B. Wilson, of Acton, survive. She was a Presbyterian in religion. Dr. Wilson conducted the services at the home and grave.

JDA H. CALDWELL. A bright young career was terminated when Mrs. Ida Henrietta Caldwell, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. H. Caldwell, passed peacefully away at the home of her parents in Limerick on a wedding day of her betrothal. A serious type of gastro sapped the life of this young woman and brought about her death. Ida Caldwell was a bright student and had before her a brilliant future. In 1925 she graduated from University with her Bachelor of Arts degree, and won the gold medal for her year. In 1926 she won her Master of Arts degree and continued her studies at the Ontario College of Education. For two years she has occupied a position on the University staff in the Department of Home Science, conducting her studies while occupying this position, she had obtained second year standing in medicine. Her ambition was to study her course in medicine and proceed to China as a medical missionary. A girl with the highest Christian ideals, with a deep love for music and the beautiful things of life, with a bright, happy, fun-loving disposition, loyal to her family and her friends, and in every line of Christian service, she will be sadly missed by all who knew her. Truly it was said of her, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, they rest in their labors and their works do follow them." She was twenty-five years of age and was born at Harford. Besides her parents, four sisters remain to mourn her loss: Elizabeth M. Caldwell, Mrs. G. R. G. Agnew, who is with her husband in Canada, where he is a lecturer in dentistry; and three other sisters, all of whom are residing in Ontario.
