Accidents and Compensation
Industry in Ontario has broken all previous records in the number of accidents reported to the Workmen's Compensation Board, there having been 8,538 accidents reported in July, or an increase of 1,150 over July a year ago, and 260 more than the number reported for October, 1928, which was the highest previous record since the commencement of the Act in 1915.
