Compensation Benefits

Total benefits of \$5,003,683.77 were awarded under the Workmen's Compensation Act during the first nine months of this year, as compared with \$5,-115,488.20 for the corresponding period last year. Itlenda here. The total number of accidents reported during the nine months was 65,752, being an increase of 8,109 over the same period last year. The fatal accidents numbered 371, as compared with 415 for the first nine months of 1928. The average daily number of accidents reported during the first nine months of 1929 was 292; the average amount of benefits awardi children spent the week-end with friends ed daily was 26,240; and the average number of cheques issued daily was 893. During September there were 7,238 accidents reported and \$605,070.06 was awarded in benefits, as compared with 7,032 accidents and \$532,021.20 benefits during September a
