With the splendid surplus announced by the Pro vincial Treasurer, Hon. J. D. Monteith, it would appear that a lightening of the tax burden would be in order. True the automobile license fee has been reduced and the amount put on where it justly belongs in an increased gasoline fax. But nuisance tax that is still with us is the amusement tax. It has been abolished on the admission charges of twenty-five cents and under and has proven a real benefit to ordinary folk who derive no benefit from the automobile fee reduction. But it still remains on all admission charges over twenty-five cents. It is a nuisance and a direct tax on the whole general public. It was a war time tax. Surely with the war over for all these years and the Provincial treasury showing a steady increase this burden might be lifted from the shoulders of the public. Its removal would be equally as popular as the reduction of the postage rated and abolition of the stamps on receipts and reduction of stamps on cheques and sales reduction that have all been inaugurated by the Dominion.Gov-

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
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
