EDITORIAL

Loyalty to Home Interests
During the recent Chautauqua Festival in town certain citizens were heard to express the opinion that the promoters of the enterprise had little regard for local financial interests in being parties to sending so much money out of town.

Last week we commented editorially on the resolution put through by the County Council regarding the highway between Milton and Acton.

Mr. Mason moved, seconded by Mr. Blain, that this Council are strongly under the impression that the Second Line, from Milton to Acton, should be taken over by the Government as a Provincial Highway.

The Milton papers however both carried the following account in the report of the County Council proceedings on this particular item:

"A resolution was brought in whereby the Provincial Department of Highways be requested to take over the Second Line, from Milton to Acton, as a connecting link between Highway Nos. 7 and Milton.

The question arises where did the "but" part of the resolution come in. Why were the Warden and Mr. Pettit appointed to interview the Minister of Public Highways on the matter? Both these men, we understand, spoke against the passing of the resolution at the Council meeting.
