### Menu Hints

Recipes for New and Novel Dishes; Household Ideas and Suggestions

Here are three suggestions for the woman who likes to prepare and serve an attractive dish that not only appeals to the palate but also to the eye. Best of all, they are healthful, easy to prepare and economical as well.

### CHERRY SOUP

12 marshmallows, finely cut  
1 pint boiling water  
6 drops cherry extract  
1 package cherry flavored gelatin  
dash of salt

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add marshmallows and stir until dissolved. Add cherry extract and extract. Chill when slightly thickened, then pour into egg boiler until consistency of whipped cream. Turn into 1 large or 6 individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve plain or with cream.

### PLATED AMMOONIA

1 pint boiling water  
4 tablespoons sugar  
12 teaspoon salt  
1 cup raspberry or grape juice  
1 cup boiling water

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add fruit juice. When slightly thickened, beat with rotary egg beater until of consistency of whipped cream. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve to six with custard sauce.

### BACON AND LIVER SANDWICH

Brown thin slices of bacon or pig's liver in bacon fat. Chop fine, season with salt and pepper, and spread over buttered bread. Add two slices of crisp bacon and liver. Season with salt and pepper. Garnish with cucumber pickle, etc. For a more moist sandwich, make a gravy of the fat in the pan. For each sandwich add one slice of bacon or liver. Stir in one egg, add 1/2 cup of milk, stock, or water and stir until gravy is thickened. Pour this gravy over the chopped liver before adding it to the sandwich.

### PICTURE-DOLLAR PIE

1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 tablespoons flour  
1/4 tablespoons melted butter  
Juice of 1 lemon  
1 egg white  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup white flour  
Few grains salt

Mix sugar and flour, add melted butter, lemon juice, and white flour.

Break egg white, add 1/2 cup of milk, stock, or water and stir until gravy is thickened. Pour this gravy over the chopped liver before adding it to the sandwich.

### SHIMON RINGER COOKIES

1 cupful butter  
1/2 cupful sugar  
1/2 cupful flour  
1/2 cupful baking powder  
1/2 cupful salt

Cream sugar with the butter; add the beaten egg, yolk, milk, salt, and flavoring. Mix baking powder with 1 cupful flour. Add to the creamed dough that is formed; if too stiff, handle well until smooth, cut in strips, then twist and form in circles.
