CHEERFUL BROWNIE

1 pint boiling water

rare sport in the Lindehouse Pond. Many
a good catch my friend and I got out
of that famous and beautiful spot or
near "The Agency" wharf. There was
never much danger of getting an
award certificate at Lindehouse Pond, how-
ever. John Moore, the captain and man-
ager of the Toronto Line Company there,
would quietly walk up to you when the
big fellows were biting, and after
peering into your fish basket, which by
this time had gotten too heavy to carry
over the shoulder, and was in the grass
beside us, would mildly remark: "Don't
you think you've got about enough now,
boys?" Naturally that would end the
sport there for that trip. Mr. Moore
was a crack fisherman himself, and they
used to say he didn't like to see too
many of the boys going out to the
pond to other fellows' ereels. But he
was a pretty good sport, nevertheless, and
never refused to follow with a fishing rod
over his shoulder a chance to try "The
Pond" for a little while, at least.
