VILLAGE OF ACTON
 BY-LAW NO. 635

A By-law to Determine the Hours of Closing of Barber Shops Within the Municipality of the Village of Acton.

Whereas an application has been presented to the Council of the Village of Acton praying for the passing of a by-law requiring the closing of Barber Shops within the Municipality of the Village of Acton during such periods of the year as are hereinafter specified and the Council is satisfied that such an application is signed by not less than three-fourths in number of the occupiers of Barber Shops situate within the said Municipality.

And Whereas Section 88 of the Factory Shop and Office-Building Act, 1927, Chapter 275, provides that Municipal Councils may pass such a by-law under said conditions.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL of the Corporation of the Village of Acton enacts as follows:

1. (1) Every Barber Shop within the Municipality of the Village of Acton shall be closed by the occupier or occupiers thereof and remain closed for such time or hours during such periods of the year as are hereinafter specified, that is to say:

(a) Except as hereinafter provided to the contrary, from Eight o'clock in the afternoon on each Monday, Tuesday and Thursday in the month of December in the year until the first day of the next following day, and from Eight o'clock in the afternoon on each Wednesday in the month of December in the year until the first day of the next following day.

(b) Except as hereinafter provided to the contrary, from Five o'clock in the afternoon on each Friday in the year until Five o'clock in the afternoon of the next following day.

(c) From Eleven o'clock in the afternoon of each Wednesday in the year until Five o'clock in the afternoon of the next following Monday.

(d) Except as hereinafter provided to the contrary, from Twelve thirty o'clock in the afternoon of each Wednesday in the year, except in December, until Five o'clock in the afternoon of the next following day.

(e) From Eight o'clock in the afternoon of each Wednesday in the year which falls within a week in which there occurs a legal holiday established by municipal by-law or otherwise, not im-

Following the said Wednesday, until five o'clock in the afternoon of the next following day.

(2) From Eleven o'clock in the afternoon of each day before a legal holiday, whether under Municipal by-law or otherwise, until five o'clock in the afternoon of the next following day.

(3) The provisions contained in subsection 1 of this section shall not in any way affect or restrict the rights of the occupiers of such Barber Shops as to the sale of tobacco or other merchandise in which they ordinarily deal.

(4) When Daylight Saving Time is in operation in the Municipality the hours of closing of Barber Shops as provided in this section shall be according to Eastern Standard Time.

(5) This by-law shall not apply to the serving of customers who were in such shops immediately before the hour of closing as hereinafter provided.

2. Any person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this by-law shall forfeit and pay at the discretion of the presiding Magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of Fifty Dollars exclusive of costs, for each offence, and, in default of payment of the said penalty and costs forthwith the said penalty and costs, or such only, may be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender, and in case of there being no distress found out of which such penalty can be levied the convicting Magistrate may commit the offender to the common jail of the County of Halton with or without hard labor, for any period not exceeding twenty-one days, unless the said penalty and costs including the costs of said distress and of the equipment and conveyance of the offender to the jail, shall be sooner paid.

3. This by-law shall take effect from and after the fifth day of May, A. D. 1930.
