**Klanman Tried Hunger Strike**  
Dr. W. A. Phillips, of Hamilton, complained in the Klu Klux Klan case, who began a three month hunger strike in the Hamilton County Jail at Milton two weeks ago Wednesday, is still on a hunger strike, which he began some days ago. His meals are placed before him three times a day and he refuses to eat. Governor McMillan states that after several visits to Phillips by his fellow-Klanmen the prisoner's cell is thoroughly searched to make sure that no food is smuggled in. He declared that Phillips' hunger strike is genuine and that he has not partaken of an ounce of jail fare or any other food. Governor McMillan believes that Phillips, who is very weak, as a result of his fast of thirteen days is about to "cut out" his hunger-strike, as advised by brother-Klanmen. He was asked by Phillips on Monday to leave him but refused to do so. "This," said the Governor, "is a sure sign that he is ready to relax a good meal. Phillips has been receiving oranges brought to him by fellow-Klanmen and friends.
