Advancing in the Wrong Direction

According to statistics recently published, the consumption of liquor in Ontario is reversed under the Liquor Control Act to those under prohibition measures. The advanced temperance measure would seem to be working in the wrong direction to advance temperance and sobriety. Here are the comparative figures: Warchouse transportations, proof gallons, spirits, 1924, 8,718,502; 1925, 11,691,495; 1926, 12,-707,306; after L. C. A., 1027, 16,400,401; 1028, 21,-767,997; 1020, 30,846,707. Transactions in beers show proportionate increase. Pigures for drunkenness in Ontario alone are as follows: Three years' complete prohibition, 1016, 11,728; 1017, 10,045; 1018, 7,932; three years' partial prohibition; 1024, 12,003; 1025, 11,811; 1926, 13,752; two years' Government sale, 1027, 14,334; 1028, 15,031. The figures for 1020 have not yet been officially published, for reasons perhaps known to the Attorney-General. Unofficial compiletions, however, are agreed that Ontario convicted more drunks in 1020 than in any previous year in history. There have been, in each year since the advent of the L. C. A., more convictions for breaches of the liquor laws than ever before. The toll still

All Industries Not a Benefit

Too many industries were using the towns and villages as a means to promote unsound companies. Now communities can lose only a small amount in actual cash, in such expenses as by-laws and other proceedings. The rejection by the Senate of the bill to make it a crime for newspapers to report the odds haid at race tracks does not put that body in any better light with the general public. It is generally conceded that the education by newspapers is an outstanding function of their usefulness. To allow the publication of these odds is simply a means of educating the public in betting on the races. Not Borne Out by Fact

The Dominion Government has paid \$140,338, 400.81 to the Provinces of Canada since W. L. Mackenzie King became Prime Minister. The latter has been charged by Premier Ferguson of Ontario and others with saying he would not give a flvo-cent piece to any Tory Government in Canada. So far as technical education, Provincial subsidies, eradication of disease and other matters are concerned, the Tory Provinces have received millions from the Federal Government, and Ontario obtained the lion's share, heading the list of the Provinces, with a total of \$32,558,138.76 received from the Dominion Government. For subsidies alone the total paid to the Provinces since 1922, is \$99,334,132.75, as follows: Prince Edward Island, \$3,055,455; Nova Scotia, \$5,204,702; New Brunswick, \$5,334,126; Quebec, \$18,051,350; Ontario, \$21,140,893; Manitoba, \$11,947,078; Saskat chewan, \$15,440,002; Alberta, \$13,150,802; British Columbia, \$5,010,533. The total payments to the Provinces by the Dominion Government since 1022 are as follows: Ontario, \$32,558,138.76; Quebec, \$26,-031,085.35; Nova Scotia, \$10,011,859.55; New Brunswick, \$8,945,286.92; Prince Edward Island, \$4,176, 046.47; Manitoba, \$15,017,320.34; British Columbia, \$0,320,947.48; Alberta, \$15,729,473.70; Saskatchowan, \$18,547,441.15; total, \$140,338,409.81. The above amounts do not include the sum of \$237,370,421.60 that has been expended on soldiers' pensions and relief to unemployed pensioners in the various Provinces of Canada.
