

CANDY AS A SELF STARTER The after effects of long-distance running have been carefully studied by those

interested in athletics and dieting. Several years ago, after the famous Boston Marathon run it was found that the physical exhaustion of the men was in exact proportion to the sugar content of the blood-those with the least sugar content being the most exhausted and vice versa.

The following year, the experiment was made of feeding the same men a large amount of carbohydrates the day before the run, and candy during the run. The runners were directed to eat the candy just before the time when exhaustion had set in during the earlier run, on the theory that candy supplied before exhaustion began would roplace the energy which had been used, and that no exhaustlon would result.

The conclusion was borne out by the results. None who had been thus fed showed the exhaustion experienced the previous year, and all made better running time. One man who was not given the carbohydrate feeding or the candy was the only one who experienced ex-
