Moved by W. A. Wilson, seconded by L. L. Mullin, that the Treasurer pay the road sheets as presented by the Road Commission, amounting to \$4,057.70.—Carried.

Moved by George Currie, seconded by W. G. Appelle, that the by-law to assess the Township of Esqueuing for the year 1930, having been read a first time, be now read a second and third times, and passed, and that the corporate seal be attached thereto.—Carried.

Moved by L. L. Mullin, seconded by George Currie, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to amend the several School Sections and Union School Sections of the Township of Esqueuing for the year 1930, and that said by-law be now read a first time.—Carried.

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## C. N. R. Crossing Reported on by Engineer Smith after Visit Here

Advices to Make a Complete Job When Work is Undertaken—Sidewalk Repairs are Requested—Application for Concession at Arena is Received—Other Matters Dealt With by Council.

The regular session of Council on Tuesday evening, Councillors Hansen and Thetford were present and Reeve Mason presided.

In absence of Clerk Farmer, Miss L. M. Reid was Acting Clerk.

The twenty-first report of the Finance Committee recommended payment of the following accounts:

The Reeve reported that Engineer Smith had inspected the C. N. R. crossing and advised construction of a hard surface on this crossing.

Arrangements were to be negotiated with the Department as to their share of the cost and an estimate of the cost was to be secured.

The Clerk was asked to consult with Medical Health Officer Dr. McNeven regarding the case.

The Clerk was instructed to render the accounts of the electric lights at the Arena to the Horseshoe Club for their share of the costs.

Mr. John Williamson requested that the sidewalk in front of the Bank of Nova Scotia be raised. The matter was left in the hands of Councillor Hansen and Chief McPherson to report on.

A letter from Mr. Elmer Walters, of Gimby, asked for the concession on the rink booth. The matter was referred to the Rink Committee to deal with.

A letter from Dr. R. K. Anderson, M. P., gave information regarding the distribution of the unemployment relief fund. The letter was filed.

## Bishop of the Hamilton Diocese Visits Acton

On Sunday, St. Joseph's Church was greatly favored by the presence of His Lordship—Right Reverend—J. P. McShay, D. D., Bishop of the Hamilton Diocese—His Lordship arrived in Acton about noon, accompanied by Right Rev. Monsignor Blair, President of the Catholic Church Extension Society.

The church was decorated inside and outside with Union Jack and Papal flags in give an appearance of welcome to the Bishop, who has not been here for over four years.

At three o'clock the church bell rang out its joyful notes and the procession, headed by cross bearer, followed by confirmation class and their sponsors, then the clergy who immediately preceded the Bishop, moving slowly from the Rectory to the church.

At the church the Bishop was met by the pastor, who extended his most hearty welcome on behalf of himself and the congregations of St. Joseph's, Acton, Holy Cross Church, Georgetown, and St. Peter's Church, Ontario. His Lordship addressed the large congregation, thanking them for their kind welcome and encouraging them to persevere with that cannot falter or waver, but those that lead to life everlasting.

His Lordship is an eloquent and forcible speaker, and a noted linguist, speaking French, Italian and German fluently. The Bishop then administered the sacrament of Confirmation to thirty-eight candidates, the largest class in the history of the parish. His Lordship was assisted by Very Rev. Dean Causley, Rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Hamilton; Rev. P. Hickey, St. Lawrence's Church, Hamilton; Rev. J. Moloney, formerly of Acton; Rev. P. O'Brien, Sacred Heart Church, Guelph; Rev. T. Traynor, St. Mary's Pro-Cathedral, Hamilton.
