Farm Fire With Heavy Loss Averted

Quick, thorough work by Port Credit Fire Brigade, aided by students from Lorn Park College, saved "Oakridge Farm," located on the Mississauga Road, and valued at \$20,000, from destruction by fire Tuesday afternoon. The farm, and residence is owned by T. H. Morris, who was absent at the time. At 3:30 p. m. an alarm was given in the village of a house burning some four miles up the Mississauga Road. The fire fighters arrived on the scene within ten minutes. Boys from the college, who were present, offered to help and began carrying water in buckets from nearby wells. After fighting the blaze for about twenty minutes it was finally got under control. Damage to the house is estimated at \$500. The alertness of the fire department in getting to the scene in such a short time made it possible to fight the flames before they gained much headway. Firemen attribute the cause of the fire to defective wiring in the house.

THREE LIVES LOST IN AIR ACCIDENT

Misses Jean and Kathleen McCall, of Inglewood, and Harry E. Tegart, are Victims of Tragedy

Struggling to give two young girl passengers a flying thrill, Harry E. Tegart, 24-year-old air-mill pilot, brought a premature death on himself and Misses Jean and Kathleen McCall, 150 Sherbourne Street, Toronto, when his plane crashed and burned late Sunday afternoon on a farm just west of Dufferin Street, three miles north of the city limits.

According to eye-witnesses, Tegart, after having done a number of barrel-rolls over the Toronto Airdrome, 1441 airport, failed to come out of a down-wind sidslip 300 feet from the ground. In the twinkling of an eye the big three-passenger Pictoua biplane had become the funeral pyre of its three occupants. It slipped and fell, hit the ground-left wing first and cartwheeled over, a flaming mass.

The two girls, Jean, 22-year-old Scarborough Township school teacher, and Kathleen, 20-year-old brother's stenographer, were sitting together in the front seat. So cruelly were they burned that when officials came to remove them, one was distinguished from the other only by the known fact that Kathleen had been seated on the right side of the plane, Jean on the left.

The Misses McCall were nieces of Mrs. Robert Kerr, Acton, and were well-known in this district. The funeral at Inglewood on Tuesday was attended by many friends from here who extend deepest sympathy in this tragedy that has ended three bright young lives.
