FUGITIVES CAPTURED
 About a Mile West of Acton—Had Escaped from the Guelph Reformatory on Tuesday

On Tuesday five inmates broke custody from the Guelph Reformatory and later that afternoon three of them were recaptured. The others, Walter White, of Gananoque, and Clifford Marshall, of Guelph, had one day's freedom, but were back in custody at the Reformatory last night.
 The pair, who had successfully eluded passes of guards for twenty-four hours, were caught late yesterday afternoon on a farm about a mile west of Acton. Information was received at the Reformatory during the day that two men, answering the description of the fugitives, had been seen in the Acton district and guards spent several hours patrolling the highways around. They were joined by Provincial Police and Chief of Police McPherson, of Acton, who gave valuable assistance in the hunt.
 It was not until later in the afternoon that the officers met with success, however, a phone call from a farmer putting them on the trail of the pair, who were caught just as they were about to enter a bush. They failed to offer any resistance when surrounded, and were taken back to Guelph immediately after being apprehended.

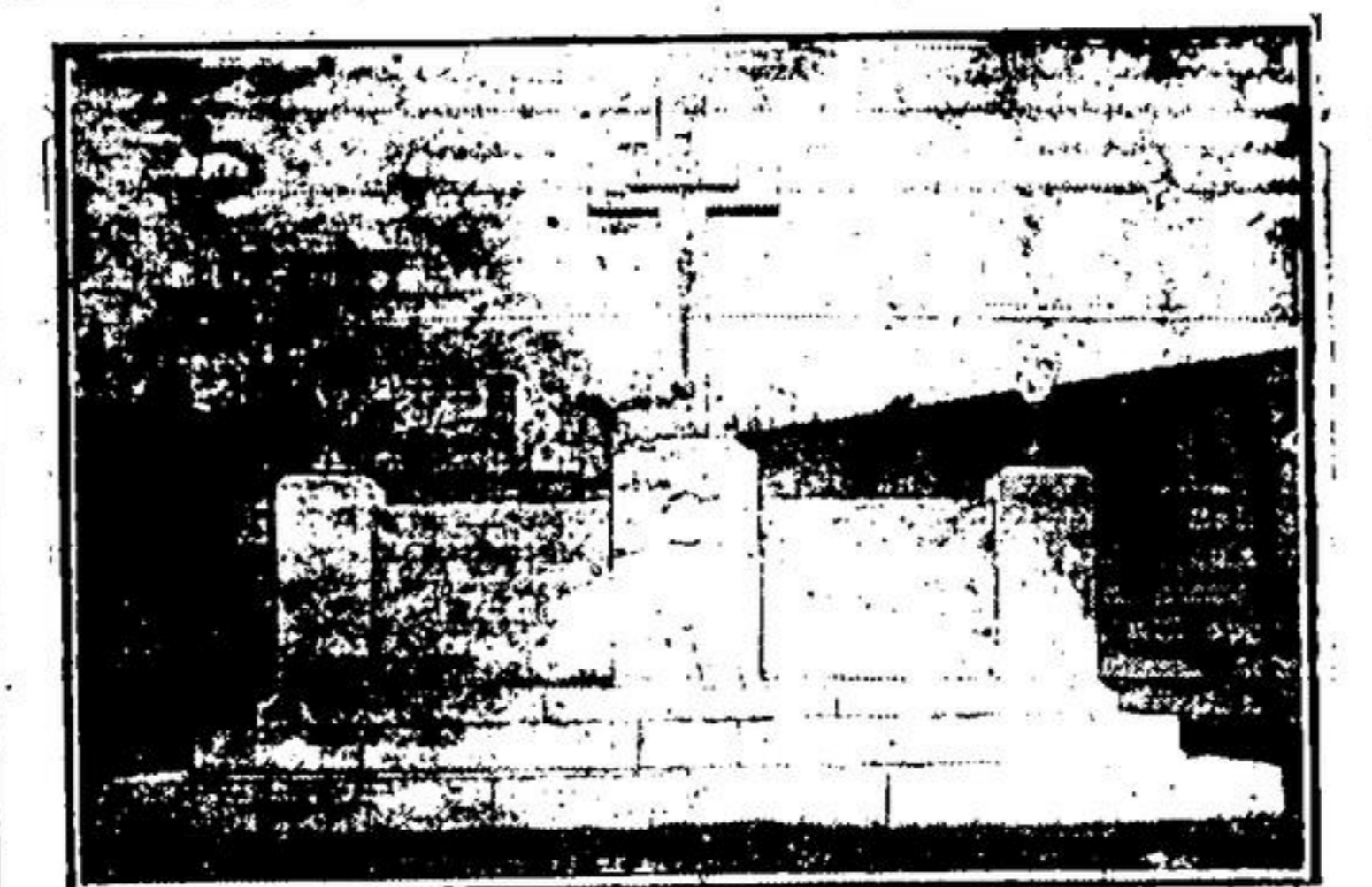
Entered Into Real

MRS. ISABELLA C. CAHOON
 Toronto
 Born in Erin Township of Scottish ancestry and residing for the greater part of her life in Toronto, Isabella Campbell Cahoon, 187 First Avenue, Toronto, died at Toronto East General Hospital last week. She was in her 81st year. She was the widow of Robert Cahoon, who for 40 years carried on business as a grocer and general merchant. She was a member of St. Giles' United Church. She is survived by an only daughter, Mrs. William J. Young, Toronto; four brothers, Archibald Campbell, of Erin; John, of Rockwood; Colin, in California; and George, in Vancouver, B. C.; and also a sister, Mrs. J. McPhail, of Parrish, Quebec; and Miss Lizzie Campbell, Toronto.

JAMES ANTHONY, Georgetown
 James Anthony, last surviving Penlan Itald member of Norval Company of the Halton Italds, passed away at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. B. Shortill, Georgetown, on Sunday, in his 94th year. Mr. Anthony was born on Lot No. 10, fourth line west, near Norval. His father, John Anthony, was a pioneer settler from Ireland, in his earlier years Mr. Anthony operated saw mills for John Currie and Robert Noble, then farmed on the 9th concession of Esqueping for 30 years, removing to Georgetown about 12 years ago. With Georgetown, Norval and Stewarttown Companies of Halton Italds, he went to Niagara Falls during the Penlan Italds, spending five weeks at St. Catharines, where he was on the border guard. For 72 years he belonged to the Orange Order, and marched at the head of Norval Lodge in his scarlet cloak and master's hat, when Orangemen were forbidden to walk in Guelph, over 60 years ago. He was a Methodist and later a member of the United Church. Mr. Anthony's wife died in 1917. He leaves one daughter, Mrs. Shortill, Georgetown. A brother also survives. The two comrades of the Penlan Itald who marched down the years with him, John Melvin and Henry Pottigrow, have predeceased him, the former a year and a half ago, the latter, a few weeks ago.
