For the ratepayers' meeting, which followed, Mr. E. Beswick was chosen to preside. Reeve A. Mason was the first speaker and explained many of the details set forth in the Pinancial Statement, and answered questions of the ratepayers relative to items of the report. He pointed out the large increase in County rates, which had been met without a corresponding increase in the tax rate, and looked with some pride on the administration of Acton's affairs during the past few years.

Councillor Hansen, who had charge of the streets and walks department, pointed to the work done on Church E. S. Simpson, Work, Township Street, which was designated as a County link. The other roadways in town were C. E. Hall, goods for J. Player nearly all in good repair also. Councillor Dr. Nelson, who came in

later, had been in charge of the Park. Improvements there were visible for all to see, and were apparently approved of J. Y. Norrish, sheep killed by the citizens and a source of pride. With a view to conserving the ratepayers' money, a re duction in the salaries of the High Echool teachers had been arranged and the levy from the people was less than last year.

Trustee Mrs. A. P. Havill who headed the Supplies' Committee, pointed out the improvements at the school in the matter of supplies. An arrangement had been made with the Free Library Board, whereby books from the Library were used at the school for supplementar. reading, and the purchase of new books had been avolded.

By by-law certain County by-laws were repealed. These repealed enactments had a variety of subjects covered. One was "to make provision for the preservation of public morals." Another was to establish and maintain a county lock-up work to do as the infielders, handled in the Village of Georgetown. A third one provided for payment of rewards for the apprehension of horse thieves. And ten others went to make up a list of obsolete laws, and are now discarded.

Another by-law, to borrow the sum of \$12,000, to meet current expenditures, was passed by Council.

A matter that caused considerable discussion was the appointment of an axsistant to the Clerk and Treasurer. The Clerk has been in this position for sixtyfive years, and the Treasurer for twentythree years.

It was moved by Mr. Mason, and seconded by Mr. McIntyre, that a by-law be prepared for the appointment of an assistant to these two offices, at a salary of \$500 per annum, and the Clerk advertise for applications throughout the. County.
