The Halton-Peel House of Refuge

J. J. Jamieson, Secretary-Treasurer of the Halton-Peel House of Refuge, gave the financial statement at a meeting of the County Council, showing receipts of \$15,413.05, and disbursements at \$14,640.64. It is estimated the house can be run to the end of the year without further call for funds. Money from Old Age Pensions diverted to pay the board of inmates amounted to \$9,873.98 for Peel and Halton.

Walkerton Endorsed Public Ownership

The principle of public ownership of power utilities was endorsed almost unanimously by the electors of Walkerton—the County Town of Bruce—when they passed, on Monday, the by-law authorizing the Town Council to make a contract with the Hydro-Electric Power Commission. A second by-law, authorizing the raising by debentures of \$62,000 to purchase the local distribution plant in that town was also passed with few opposition votes.

New Game Preserve in Halton

The Department of Game and Fisheries on Monday posted notices at Brantford, declaring the formation of a game preserve on the banks of the Twelve-Mile Creek, comprising an area of 400 acres. The new preserve is between the second and third concessions, south of the Dundas highway, and extends one-half mile on either side of the river. The district here, which is ideally wooded, abounds with pheasants and other wild life and will be known as the Woodlands Preserve.

Canadians Win in Cattle Divisions at Chicago

Fred Deacon, of Unionville, Ontario, was awarded the Thomas E. Wilson special prize of \$1,000 for the best two head of breeding Shorthorns, bull and female, at the International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago, yesterday. T. A. Russell, of Downsview, Ontario, won fourth place in the class for pairs of Shorthorn bull calves, and in the milking Shorthorn competition at Earl Blegenman and son, of Waterloo, Ontario, won second place in the cow-in-milk class, with Heta Melods. Deacon's victory was accomplished with his bull, Glenburn Field, and the female, Glenburn Broadhocks. The Blegenman family, of Waterloo, scored another place victory when they won second honors in the class for breeding cattle before August 1, 1929.

TAKING CHANCES

Statistics show that in every group of twenty-five thousand people, twenty-one will meet death by accident during the year. The fatalities due to automobiles are in the lead, of course; yet almost as many are killed by falls. Many of these accidents are unavoidable and others are due to carelessness. On country roads, warning of the nearness of real trucks is always given, frequently with the added admonition, "Stop! Look! Listen!" Yet every year a large number of people drive past these warnings upon the tracks and are killed. The use of kerosene to quicken a sluggish fire accounts every year for a number of agonizing deaths. Ordinary caution would reduce the number of fatal accidents very largely.

Normal young people, love life, but they are dangerously ready to take risks. When out in the car, they try to beat the train to the crossing, or to get over the cross street before the street car passes. They handle firearms recklessly. They change places when out canoeing, and in innumerable other ways, swell the number of tragedies that make up so large a part of the day's news. If you love life, guard it at least as carefully as you do your pocketbook. Do not risk it to save a few seconds of time, or to carry out some whim of no especial importance.

VENTILATION FOR CELLARS

A great many potatoes and roots will be stored this autumn in the Maritime Provinces. The question of ventilation for bins and storage cellars is a most important one. The potato tuber is a living unit and requires pure air for respiration. This was demonstrated at the Charlottetown Experimental Station by putting potatoes in a glass preserve jar and sealing it for a few weeks. When the potatoes had used up the air in the jar they died and the vile odor that escaped when the jar was opened would convince anyone that potatoes must have air to live.

The essential requirements for good ventilation in the cellar are to provide sufficient intakes for pure dry air, to maintain temperatures ranging from 38 degrees Fahrenheit to 46 degrees Fahrenheit if possible, and to provide outlets large enough to carry off surplus heat and impure air. Potatoes also require storage in the dark. Provision should be made for cooling potatoes and roots rapidly when first stored by means of other than the regular ventilators. For this purpose the doors and hatches may be left open at night during the early autumn. Slatted ventilator shafts should extend along the floor of the cellar and up through the roots to an outlet. For potatoes double slatted partitions between ten foot bins provide satisfactory ventilation if outlets are large enough. The ventilators should be fitted with hinged doors so that the openings can be reduced or closed when the weather becomes severe.—Experimental Farm Note.
