1930 Biggest Year for Acton Fair D. D. Waldie is New President

Substantial Cash Balance on Hand and Assets are Increased—W. R. Kenney and C. McKeown Vice-Presidents—This Year's Fair to be Held on September 15 and 16—Appreciation of Services Recognized at Meeting.

The annual meeting of Acton Fall Fair was held yesterday afternoon in the Council Chamber, with a fairly representative attendance. President J. R. Kennedy presided. The report of the activities of the past year showed that 1930 had been the biggest year in the history of Acton Fair. The receipts were the largest on record, and amounted to \$3,641.92. The expenditures were \$3,007.57. There is a cash balance on hand amounting to over \$150. With the changes at the Park and Arena, \$228.28 had been expended this year on permanent fixtures and equipment, so that actually a surplus of nearly \$400 had been secured from the year's activities. The reports of all committees pointed out that the past year had been a wonderful success from every standpoint. It was decided to hold the usual Standing Crop and Field Competition, and Messrs. Pearen and McKeown will arrange the details.

The dates of the Fair were set at the same time as usual, with the second day to fall on the third Wednesday in September—the dates of the 1931 fair will be September 15 and 16. Mr. W. O. Brownridge, who was a large exhibitor at Acton and other fairs in the neighborhood, was called on by the President for his criticisms of Acton Fair. Mr. Brownridge had been an exhibitor at nine fairs, and felt that Acton's fair was the outstanding fair he attended. He had also had the privilege of attending the annual meetings of several fairs of the district, and gave points of experience at these meetings. The officers for the year were elected as follows:

Waldie, said he had always used his endeavors to advance Acton Fair and in his new office would endeavor to be faithful to his duties. He expressed his appreciation of the honor conferred.

Mr. R. J. Kerr gave his impressions of the activities of the various fairs, and compared Acton with the many he had attended, as District Director, for the past year. Recognition of the outstanding work of Mr. Boardman for Acton Fair the past year was expressed in a vote of appreciation of his work. The Secretary was instructed to write a letter conveying the thanks of the Society.

A vote of thanks was tendered Secretary Akhis for the able and efficient conduct of the office.

Following the annual meeting the Directors met, when many of the plans for the Fair of 1931 were discussed.

100 YEARS AGO

Minutes from Nassagaweya Township Council and Appointees of 1831.

The following minutes from the Minutes Book of Nassagaweya Township Council of 1831 and the list of appointees of a century ago will be read with interest by our readers. They have kindly been furnished "The Free Press" by the present Township Clerk, Mr. John Marshall.

On the first Monday of January, 1831, in the year 1831, a town meeting was held at Mr. William "Fruitgown's" farm, in Nassagaweya, when the following men were chosen to office:

Town Clerk—Donald Black.

By majority of the meeting, fences are to be lawful at 5 feet 6 inches high. Each Pathmaster had about six miles of road to oversee.

Fire at Aberfoyle

Loss, estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$5,000, was caused when a fire barn on a farm occupied by E. W. Muller, Aberfoyle, was totally destroyed by fire last Thursday. The barn, which is owned by John Mills, a former resident of Aberfoyle, was partially insured. The cause of the blaze is unknown, but it is stated that smoke was discovered issuing from a straw pile by a boy. By the time members of the family arrived, it was blazing fiercely, and efforts to save the building were fruitless. One horse, which was stabled in the barn, was removed to safety. The contents, consisting chiefly of straw, were also totally destroyed. The barn was a fine, new building, with a steel roof.

The Salvation Army of Hamilton requested a grant, but the Council did not accede to the request.

Acton Now Heads Local Group Since its Win from Burlington

A Fast and Slow Game Both Taken by Acton to Capture Group Leadership—On the Arrow Special—Juniors Roughly Treated When They Play in Georgetown When Spectators Take Hand in Game—Win in Milton, 4-1.

CLIMBING

Another rung on the ladder to the top of the group was reached for Acton on Friday night when the locals defeated Oakville by 3 to 1 in the fastest game of hockey witnessed at Acton Arena this year. Both these teams are fast and show to best advantage on a big, keen ice surface, and they had ideal conditions on Friday night. It was a real contest, but the Acton boys were the better team, and won on merit. The Oakville forward line in fact but has nothing on Acton in that quality. Acton was superior on defence and in goal both teams had good performers. Every goal scored on Friday night was an earned effort and a lot of efforts on the part of both teams didn't register as scores.

The first period found both teams playing about the same kind of crummy hockey, it gave the impression from the outset as being anybody's game. Acton bored right in to register a score time and time again, but failed. Oakville seemed to be getting the breaks, and they capitalized on every one of them. The first score of the game came when Peer for Oakville beat the defence and went right through on Holloway and scored a clean shot that it was next to impossible to save. The first goal for Acton to even the score came when Salmon scored from a scramble in front of the Oakville net. Although it nestled in the corner nicely the goal referee was tardy in allowing the goal. He was not familiar, apparently, with electric buttons and required some assistance in flashing the red signal light. The period ended with the score even. Peer and Walters each drew one penalty.

Period number two was livelier. Acton rained shots against the invulnerable Kells in the Oakville goal, and bored in continually. Thomas, at centre for Oakville was fast but C. Kentner and Salmon were effective in the back checking and held him from getting away. Penalties were more plentiful in this period, with Oakville taking three and Acton drawing two. Play was clean but the checking was hard. Arbie was the man for Acton to break the tie. When he took a pass from Parlow his clean shot registered. This was Arbie's first goal of the season. He has been playing well and has a good shot but until Friday he hadn't registered. The score was better at the end of this period, with 2-1 for Acton.

Shortly after the opening of the third period Shannon body-checked Joe Kentner hard, and when Joe went down his skate cut a bad gash in Shannon's neck. It required medical attention, and Shannon was out for the rest of the game. Fortunately Dr. Nelson was in the audience, and when the injury was attended to, play was resumed. Acton did not play defensive hockey although they were leading and this strong offensive soon started to show on Oakville. They tried the four men up game and weakened and when Salmon Greer and Walters broke through they had only a one-man defence to beat to make the score 3-1. Referee Ernie Parkes was a bear on the offences and called them close. In this period both teams had a chance on a play that had been called back. Oakville drew the majority of penalties again in this period registering four against three from Acton. In this period Acton showed they were the superior team. A couple of rushes by Peer wore the only high lights that the visitors provided and each time his shot was off. It was clearly seen in this period that Acton were masters, but the game was the last notch of the season for a hockey exhibition, and Oakville provided the only play. It was Acton and Oakville for second place in the group.
