Matthew McCann, Bracebridge

The following obituary notice of Matthew McCann, a former resident of Acton, is reprinted from the Bracebridge Gazette: "After a lengthy illness, Mr. Matthew McCann, a highly respected citizen of this town, passed to the Great Beyond last Saturday morning, after a slightly ill illness of two months. The funeral took place on Monday morning, April 13. Service was held in St. Joseph's Church at nine o'clock, Rev. Doan O'Leary officiating. Interment took place in St. Joseph's cemetery. The pallbearers were Messrs. J. L. Cullis, P. J. Martin, Jas. Fitzmaurice, I. J. Pollock, Peter Grozoll and Jas. Reid. Besides the widow left to mourn the loss are: the following children—Anne (Mrs. George Fitzmaurice), Mount Forest, Ontario; Margaret (Mrs. Wilson), Detroit, Michigan; John and Matthew, of Detroit; and Austin, of South Bend, Indiana. The late Mr. McCann was born at Acton, Ontario, in 1843. In his younger years he travelled extensively in the United States and was in Chicago when that city was destroyed by fire in 1871. On February 11, 1881, he married Miss Margaret Kennedy, the ceremony being performed at Georgetown, Ontario, by Rev. Father J. H. Macdonald, S. J. He came to Bracebridge with his family in 1901. At that time he was employed at Acton with the Beardmore Leather Co. and was brought to Bracebridge by Mr. Anthony Schneider, who was then in charge of the Anglo-Canadian Leather Company's tannery in Bracebridge. All the children were home for the funeral excepting Mrs. Fitzmaurice, who was unable to be present. Mr. McCann was widely known and highly respected in Bracebridge, where for the past thirty years he has been a worthy citizen. Many people attended the funeral to pay their last tribute of respect to a good neighbor and friend."

NASSAGAWEYA COUNCIL

Holds Two Meetings This Month—Township Insurance is the Main Item Dealt With

At the meeting of Nassagaweya Council on April 6, several accounts of a charitable nature were passed, amounting to \$27.45. The Road Superintendent's voucher was for \$370.13. Representatives of several insurance companies discussed rates and terms with the Council, who instructed the Clerk to make some inquiries re rates and terms, and adjourned till the 13th to settle the question. On that date the Council unanimously decided to pass the following resolution: "That we renew our policy of insurance against accidents on the highways of this Township, with the Globe Indemnity Co., covering our liability under Section 469 of the Municipal Act, and the liability of the village of our highways has been increased, and whereas the Globe Indemnity Co. recognize the mistake and have offered to refund the consequent overcharge for 6 years of business, amounting to \$169.20, we hereby accept the rebate and instruct the Treasurer to issue cheque for \$169.20, being balance of premium of \$186.00, to insure from April 20, 1931, to April 20, 1932." Council adjourned to meet May 25.

If Actonians would appreciate this recreation it would appear that right now is the time to start a membership drive and show their desires in a practical way. Unless the past few years have seen a steady decline in the number of participants that will offer finer opportunities for pleasure and sociability at these reasonable rates.

Charter Night and Banquet of Acton Legion, Outstanding Success

Visiting Comrades from Neighboring Branches and Prominent Citizens Witness the Ceremonies in Connection with the Youngest Branch in the Dominion—Splendid Banquet and an Evening of Comradeship.

Acton Post of the Canadian Legion, No. 197, starts off backed by the citizens in all walks of life, judging from the attendance at their Charter Night function on Tuesday. It must have, indeed, been an inspiration to the officers and members to feel with the attendance on that night that the support of the community and the best wishes of the surrounding Posts were loyal back of this youngest branch in the Dominion. There was provision for over an hundred guests at the banquet tables in the club rooms on Frederick street, and it was found necessary to provide additional tables and accommodations before the evening was over to provide for the guests arriving from other centers. Vice-President J. M. McDonald presided over the programme and was toastmaster, and the gathering included all the municipal officials, the clergy, member of Legislature, judge, the press and representatives from neighboring posts and friends. Two minutes' silence was observed at the opening of the banquet in memory of the departed comrades and this was broken by the sounding of the Last Post, "O Canada" was lustily sung by the gathering and grace was given by Rev. C. L. Poole. A delectable and appetizing banquet menu had been provided by the ladies. The tables were well laden and the serving and arrangements were indeed a credit to the committee in charge, and the efforts of the wives of the comrades who carried the affair through so successfully. It was favorably commented on by the speakers and the visitors attending. Following the toast to "The King," and the National Anthem, President W. J. Gould welcomed the guests of the Legion and expressed the pride he felt at the gathering assembled. He paid tribute to the work of Secretary Wright and the Entertainment Committee. He pointed out that the Legion was not in the organization for personal benefit but to help the returned men who were unable to work. He was pleased to see the municipally so well represented and hoped the Legion would prove an asset to the community. The presentation of the charter and the initiation of the members of Acton Branch into the Legion followed. This was in charge of Col. J. P. Pickering, First Vice-President of the Provincial Command, and Honorary Secretary. He was assisted by Capt. James, Zone Commander, and Comrade Robertson. In view of the fact that there were almost fifty members to be received the President and Officers and Executive took the obligation and initiation ceremony, with the members all standing. President Gould, Vice-Presidents J. M. McDonald and H. G. Arnold, Secretary P. L. Wright and Executive Members J. P. Pickering and W. Keeshill were presented by the Sergeant-at-Arms, and received the charter and took the vows. Solos by Comrade "Scotty" Burton, with the chorus by the assemblage, and community singing, with Mr. P. Salt as accompanist, provided appreciated musical numbers that were joined in with real vim. Capt. James, Zone Commander, was proud of Acton Branch, and the splendid start they had made. The officers, the quarters all came in for a share of the prizes, and he urged comrades and citizens to give the Branch their sympathetic support. The Branch will never be any bigger than its officers and Acton Branch had been fortunate in the choice of its new officers. There were two sides to the work of the Legion, the serious side, dealing with pensions and relief, and the comradeship and entertainment phase of the organization. Comrade Robertson, Adjustment Officer of the Provincial Command, gave a wealth of information regarding the work of his department. To Jail for Three Months
On March 17 James Passmore had liquor in a shed at Ospringe, and gave a couple of drinks to Gordon Drury, who works for Joseph Bingham, to induce him to drive to Hillsburg. The liquor, which was evidently of a vile content, had serious effects upon the lad. He was very ill for several days and threatened with blindness. Last Friday Provincial Constables Zinham and Menzie, of Guelph, laid information against Passmore before Magistrate Moore, charging him with having liquor and with supplying liquor to a minor. On Monday the officers arrested Passmore at Marsville and lodged him in Guelph goal. Tuesday morning Magistrate Moore requested Magistrate Watt, of Guelph, to have the prisoner come before him for trial. He pleaded guilty to both charges and was fined \$100 and costs or two months in jail for having liquor, and \$50.00 and costs or three months in jail for giving Gordon Drury liquor. He was returned to jail for three months, the two sentences to run concurrently. That was shouldered by those now in office. Col. Pickering promised that if possible he would address the Legion at greater length and supply fuller details when the Zone meeting was arranged by Capt. James.

On behalf of the Legion, Chairman McDonald thanked the visiting comrades and citizens for their support and bespoke their continued co-operation in making the Acton Branch a successful organization. The event closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

SPRINGTIME IN CANADA

For the Lover of Outdoors No Other Country Offers More Delightful Attractions

Following one of the mildest winters ever experienced in Canada, spring came earlier this year than for many years past. In the Prairie Provinces—Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta—old timers avow that there was virtually no winter at all in 1930-31. In Eastern and Western Ontario, and parts of Quebec, daffodils in home gardens have been blooming for about two weeks and early tulips have begun to appear in their kaleidoscope of color. Usually it is the end of April or early in May before these flowers bloom. Since the latter part of March golfers throughout the greater part of the Dominion have been active on the links and even tennis was re-introduced by ardent disciples of the game during the Easter holidays. The migratory birds have returned, trees are about to burst into tender leaf, farmers are busy seeding their crops, rivers and streams have been unlogged from winter's grip by the vernal sun, fishermen are getting tackle ready for action, and inquiries from distant points are pouring into the tourist bureau in different Canadian centres for information on subjects in which prospective tourists are more interested. Spring has come again in Canada; summer is in the offing. For the lover of outdoors there is no country that offers a wider range or more delightful attractions than Canada.

A Home that Won't Burn
A second attempt to burn down the old Hazel house at Burlington Beach again failed, and police authorities are quite puzzled. A couple of men arriving from Hamilton late at night saw fire and smoke, and it was thought that only the roof was involved. They, with guests returning home from a community social, put out the fire, but Chief Taitlin arriving 5 or 10 minutes later, found the fire blazing away in a cupboard under a stairway. The city department at Hamilton sent help, and the blaze was extinguished. One of the first men to arrive said he heard a loud explosion, and others corroborated his statement, but no one can figure out what caused it. After the last fire an insurance adjuster ordered the house to be put in a proper state of repair, and this work was to be undertaken next week.

Car Demolished Near Norval
A Toronto car was demolished by a fire of unknown origin on No. 7 Provincial Highway, near Norval, on Monday night. No one was hurt, and the car was taken to a Georgetown garage without the owner reporting to the police.

An Opportunity for Observation
The decision of the Council to shorten the period for daylight saving time seems to have met with general favor and been appreciated by the factions on both sides. The adoption of daylight saving time as planned this year will give a splendid opportunity for observation as to which period causes the most inconvenience to the greatest number. Acton will be out of step for three months with the neighboring cities and towns and for two months with the rural folk in regard to the standard of time observed.

To Open New Store in Acton
The stock of the Reliable Clothiers, who were adjudged bankrupt recently, has been purchased by Mr. Ben D. Lachlin, of Toronto, and will be put on sale at a date to be announced later. Mr. Lachlin will take charge of both the stores in the Starkman Block, and as soon as alterations are completed put in a five-piece stock of ladies' and men's wear, operating the one store as a ladies' specialty shop and the other as a men's furnishing store. Mr. Lachlin is connected for purchasing power with the D. Brill Co., of Georgetown and Brampton.

New Timetable on Steam Line
Effective on Sunday, a new timetable goes into force on the C. N. E. steam line passing through Acton. The west-bound trains are now due here daily, except Sunday at 7:38 a. m.; 9:08 a. m., flag stop; 11:28 p. m.; 6:18 p. m., 7:14 p. m., and daily at 10:22 p. m., flag stop. Sunday only, at 10:18 a. m. The east-bound arrivals are due here daily, except Sunday, at 6:31 a. m.; 10:05 a. m., flag stop; and 6:18 p. m.; and daily, including Sunday, at 2:28 p. m. and Sunday only at 8:00 p. m. The Chicago flyer will, after that date pass through Acton at 9:33 p. m., but does not stop here.
