Provincial Campaign Against Poor Brakes

At the instance of the Highway Traffic Department a general campaign against faulty brakes on motor vehicles is being waged throughout the Province by Traffic Officers and police. Owing to the frequent serious accidents, due to defective brakes, it is felt this menace to public safety must be overcome. Cars are being stopped by traffic officers on highways in this district and brakes are subjected to tests. The Highway Traffic Act provides stiff penalties in cases where the braking appliances are unsatisfactory.

For the first offence, a fine of not less than \$10 and not more than \$50 is provided for. A second offence is punishable with a fine of not less than \$20 and not more than \$100, with a clause which makes possible the suspension of permits. For third or subsequent offences, a fine of not less than \$50 and not more than \$200 is provided for with a jail term of 30 days.
