Exposition.—I. Jesus Proclaimed the Messiah by His Disciples, 29-35.

But what a difference in the outside world in such a few days. The fields are beginning to look green, the trees are definitely showing promise of life, the flowering bulbs are a delight to the eye.

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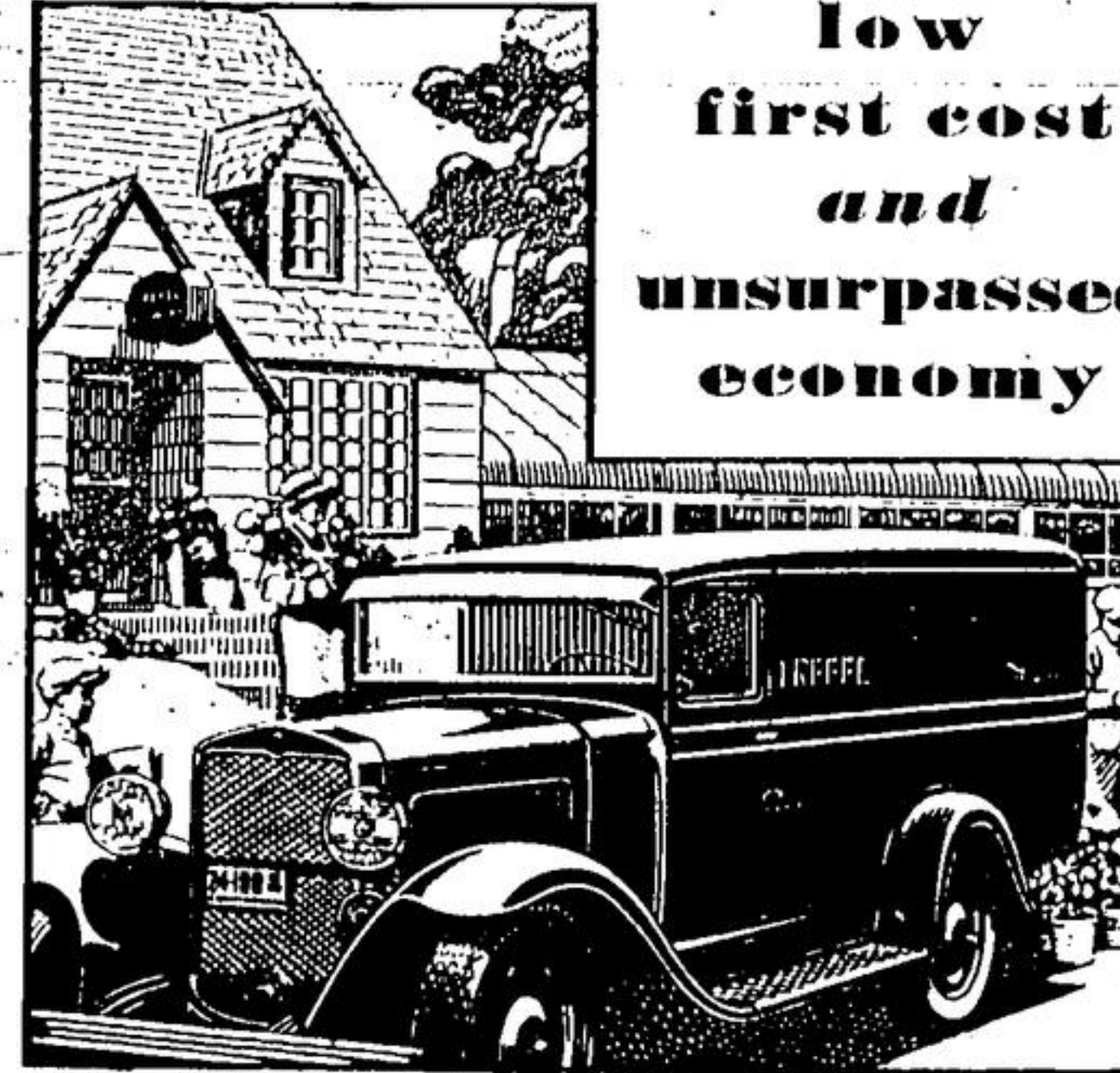
