EDUCATION IN CANADA

In a recently issued report on education in Canada it is stated that technical education increased from 1920 to 1929 about four fold. For every four pupils in ordinary high schools in the Dominion there is one in day technical schools. Evening technical classes enroll-50 per cent, more than the day classes. Porty per cent. of all students in Canadian schools now do some high school work.

Education in Canada is under the jurisdiction of the Provincial Governments. Each province has its own system of public schools. In these schools during the year under review 2,080,949 pupils were enrolled for elementary and secondary instruction in 29,707 school houses and in which 65,305 teachers were employed. About 13 per cent. of the pupils were doing work of secondary or high-school grade. Attendance at the technical or vocational schools totalled 122,671, at 281 schools with 4,389 instructors. Private elementary and secondary schools accounted for 74,235 pupils, and private business colleges reported 18,-500 pupils. The 120 universities and colleges offering higher education had

Acton, Ontarlo Petitions are being circulated in Halton County, asking the Ontario Government to permit the sale of beer and wine in food produce stores; that is in grocery

It is nearly two generations since the sale of liquor was permitted in grocery stores in this Province. The step proposed would be altogether retrograde and would expose children and youth to familiarity with liquor in a manner which all good citizens will abhor. Promoters of this movement' have offered workers a.; much as \$10.00 a day and-canvassers are being liberally paid for alguatures. There is evidence that plenty of money is behind the undertaking. It is not difficult to surmise for whose interests it b being promoted or who will profit most if it will succeed. While it is improbable that in the face of general public opinion no Government would accede to the specific request contained in the petition a considerable number of signatures t the document will doubtless be urged as evidence of dissatisfaction with the present law, with a view to widening its provisions for the sale of beer and wine The danger is of some compromise on larging the privileges for sale of thes

liquors in other ways. Beer, which o dmarfy averages about DG, is quite capable of causing drunkenness, and wine, which in some case; reaches 27% alcohol, approaches very closely to strong Equor. Freer access to these commodities would not only lead to increased consumption, but would lend to drunkenness; would be a cloak under which even stronger liquors might readily be concealed, and because of the reputation for mildness associated with both beer and wine, would lend itself to added

temptation of the unwary. We desire to call the attention of the people of Halton to the matter that they may be on their guard and may not be misled by deception or spurious argument to associate themselves with a movement that can only be to the detriment of many.
