PREPARING THE PULLETS FOR THE

LAYING CONTEST Pullets intended for Egg Laying Contests should be bred from good parentage. There are many factors to be considered in wood parentage but in this particular instance constitution, focusdity and normal size for the breed are attributes worthy of serious consideration. The problems of breeding are not to simple, however, that the progeny of such desirable matings will prove to be all good producers. Pactors other than heredity, which affect production, are

nimerous but the two most important mes are freedom from disease or parasitic infection, and proper feeding. Convincing evidence ds available at Ottawa and other Laying Contests conducted by the Exerimental Parms Branch of the Pederal Department of Agriculture to show that pullets which enter the Lalyng Contests from the finest blood lines and have parasitic infection or are improperly developed make hopeless

failures so far as production is concerned. Probably the only way to keep baby chicks free from parasites is to raiso them on clean ground each year. This chould not be difficult and is the plan adopted on all well regulated poultry

The question of proper feeding is cigantic task and while it is not difficult to raise chickens to the laying stage, it is quite another; thing to raise them properly so that they will commence laying at the right time, produce regularly and in abundance and at the same time lay eggs which are normal in size and possess the constitution necessary to withstand continual production during the pullet laying year. Probably the attempt to force pullets into laying before they are properly developed has been the greatest drawback to successful and Mrs. J. A. LEMON WITH VEGETABLES

During the next few months housewives will kerve a great many vegetable dishes. Lemon blends with a surprising number of these, and lemon julee and lemon garfilshes should be featured as often as possible, not only for their taste, but for their healthfulness.

For refreshing wilted vegetables add juice of one lemon to pan of water. Lemon Juice may be used with new potatoes. Add 14 cup lemon juice to 3 tablespoons brown butter and pour over 18 medium-sized new potatoes that have been bolled and drained.

Add lemon juice to cooked spinach, allowing one tabespoon to each cup cooked vegetable. Melted butter may be added also. If preferred, spinach may be served with lemon garnishes, allowing each person to use lemon julce as desired.
