DELIGHTFUL SHIVERY DISHES

When the wintry winds howl one seeks
the warmth. Even at the dinner table
he casts his eye longingly at the steam-
ing hot dishes. "Red-hot" soup is one of
the most popular courses. Coffee, equal
"red-hot," is equally popular.

There are two or three suggestions for
coffee dishes that will prove very attractive
at any time of the year but probably
particularly attractive during the heat of
summer. Try them and see for yourself.

LONDON PUDDING
2 egg yolks
1/2 cup butter or substitute
1 cup confectioner's sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
11 lady fingers
whipped cream
5 tablespoons strong brewed coffee
Cream eggs, butter and sugar together
thoroughly, add coffee and vanilla. Place
in a dish a layer of lady fingers, then
some of the sauce and alternate until all
material is used. Let stand several hours
in the refrigerator. Serve with whipped
cream. Nuts and cherries may be used
for decorating.

ICED COFFEE PUNCH
In a bowl place a block of ice. Make
your coffee by the drip method, which
means it should be finely ground and that
it will be fragrant. Coffee should be fully
a half stronger than usual because of
dilution by the ice. Pour four cups of
coffee over ice. Add a cup of heavy
cream and 2-3 cup powdered sugar. Then
place a quart of vanilla ice cream in the
punch bowl in large spoonfuls, and a cup
of maraschino cherries and their juice.
Chill punch thoroughly and serve.

Make coffee a little stronger than
usual—as ice dilutes it. Serve in large
foam or colored glasses, with plenty of
cracked ice. Sweeten to taste. Top with
whipped cream or serve with plain cream.
Coffee may be cooled before hand, or
poured hot over the ice where ice is
plentiful.

The phrase by which Luke de-

overflowing their banks; (cf. Ps. 23: 5)

with joy came from being filled with the
Holy Ghost. (Gal. 5: 22).
The joy of the Holy Ghost often is
hand in hand (1 The. 1: 6; 1 Pet. 4: 14;
2 Cor. 8: 2). In the final verses of our
lesson (Ro. 8: 14-16) the Apostle to the
Gentiles makes his apostolic gift of
his testimony. "I am not ashamed," he
cries, exulting, "of the Gospel of Christ."
