KILLED ON RAILWAY TRACKS

Bedy of Malcolm Muir Found West of Hockwood-Was Seen in Acton on Friday

Believed to have fallen from a freight. train, the body of Malcolm Muir, of Lorneville Junction, was found on the C. N. R. tracks west, of Rockwood on Baturday. The head was badly amashed. The skull was fractured and the face was badly manuled. Identification was made by the Provincial Police, through documents found on his person.

Muir was seen in Acton on Priday night and it is believed that he jumped a freight here, falling off between Rockwood and Guelph. It is believed he had been dead for some hours when the body was discovered by the engineer of a passenger train, who reported to officials in Guelph, who had the body removed to
