

> > Gasoline Thieves Given Sentences at Guelph

Wilfred Hockney and Charles. Mc-Combs, two Peel Township men, who pleaded guilty a week ago to stealing gasoline from farmers in the vicinity of Drayton, were on Tuesday sentenced to indeterminate terms of three to Lix months in the Ontario Reformatory.
