CANADIAN BEAN PRODUCTION

"Field Beans in Canada" (Pamphlet) 1441 N B) which has just been received from the King's Printer, contains some interesting information about the production of beans as an industry as well as complete detail with respect to the cuitivation of this crop.

The average production of beans in Canada during the last five years was 1,313,870 bushels, or an average yield of 16.9 bushels to the acre. Boan production is general throughout

the Dominton. Ontario's average for the period having been 934,880 bushels annually; Quebec, 275,660 bushels; Nova Beotia, 35,250 bushels; New Brunswick, 35,150 bushels; British Columbia, 16,500 bushels; Haskatchewan 11,330 bushels; and Alberta 4,200 bushels. The bulk of the commercial crop came from Ontario, with southern Ontario showing a decided

Kent Elgin and Huron. Pield beans marketed as dried beans are used almost entirely for human food.

The approximate annual consumption of beans in Canada has reached 1,500,000 bushels in recent years, and to meet this demand imports ranging from 100,000 to 300,000 bushels annually are required. This supply comes largely from Japan,


