HONEYMOON COUPLES FAVOR CASPE

Caspe Peninsula, and the eight little villages which lie hidden in the coves and valleys of this part of Eastern Quebec, is rapidly supplanting Niagara Falls as a paradise for honeymooners, according to the traffic officials of the Canadian National Railways. A few years ago few couples even considered Caspe; to-day the numbers boarding the Maritime Express for Matapedia, New Carlisle, Caspe Town and other Caspe centres has shown such an increase that during certain months in summer this train is referred to as the "Honeymoon Special." A WARNING TO THE Electrical Trade

IT has come to our attention that several unapproved and sub-standard types of ELECTRICAL WATERS HEATERS containing particularly dangerous features have been offered for sale in Ontario, contrary to the law. TO the users of unapproved equipment, Rule 108—108.—No person shall use any electrical equipment unless and until a certificate of approval therefor has been issued by the Commission. For refusing or neglecting to comply with the provisions of these Rules, the offenders are liable to prosecution under The Power Commission Act. TO the sellers of unapproved equipment, we draw attention to Rule 103. 103.—No person shall dispose of, or attempt to dispose of, any electrical equipment, other than that which has been approved, without furnishing with it a plainly printed notice that its use in the Province of Ontario is unlawful.
